2024 WMTA REGIONALS AND STATE KEYBOARD EVENT – May 2024

As I write this, we are still three weeks away from our first Regional weekend. So, this is a good time to happily shine light on topics surrounding scheduling:

REQUESTS and SWITCHING!!

Many teachers, on behalf of parents, request special consideration for their student. Sometimes it takes the form of a very gracious request, most times it takes the form of a statement. My answer to a request is always the same: I don't take requests, unless it involves a family emergency or hardship.

Asking for extra consideration when a student has another event usually seems very reasonable to a parent or teacher. This other event often has undeniably great value. But this simple request puts an unreasonable hold on the already complex process of scheduling.

For this reason, I say no requests, but I will make a note, and make no guarantees. I have to stand by this, and here's why: Regional scheduling is not just scheduling the individual student, as we do at district auditions. Regional scheduling is scheduling an entire grade level block, or multiple grade levels, in one site. Coordinating siblings needs to be done (always complex across grade levels) and each site needs to be balanced so that each site is done around the same time.

And time is an important factor. Regional competitions always include a Winner's Recital at day's end, which is often the gem of the day! We want to ensure a reasonable start time, while ensuring that an audience, including the Winners, will be in attendance and able to perform. And, for those families who have traveled, it's important to send them on their way home at an acceptable time.

I have also had teachers/parents who will ask me, after the schedule has been published, if they can switch with another student, same grade level, same site. While this also seems like a benign request, my answer is always the same: No. Once the schedules are published, there can be no changes.

I have to stand by this, and here's why: As soon as the schedule is published, the judges' forms are prepared. They go into production, with sites and times printed on the forms. They are collated in the order of performance to facilitate ease of distribution to judges folders. These must be in order, or ease of distribution to judge's folders cannot happen. Switches would create glitches! Student certificates are also being prepared, collated in an order facilitating distribution to teachers' packets. Again, switching creates additional and unreasonable time spent re-ordering certificates. And of course, there are a mass of coordinations that cannot be changed.

Time requests and switching requests are made by wonderfully well-meaning and supportive parents/teachers, who are advocating for their students. I understand this, and I wanted to share my thoughts, hoping to build understanding around these topics.

And brave to the 300 students and 90 teachers across WI who participated in another successful and exciting Regional/State Keyboard event! Results will be posted in the next newsletter, and on the WMTA Facebook page.

MTNA 2024 Conference Session on Nutrition for Performing Artists

A week before the MTNA national conference this month, I decided to arrive a day early so I could attend "Pedagogy Saturday." I am very glad I did. The second session that morning, "Strategies for Breaking Common Nutritional Myths," was part of the Musician Wellness Track at the conference. Going into it, I was expecting the standard well-organized presentation about how proper diet and exercise are important for doing one's best as a performing musician. But the presentation itself, by research scientist Dan Bernardot, PhD, of the Center for the Study of Human Health at Emory University, went far beyond what I expected. Dr. Bernardot looked at eleven common misperceptions about nutrition and health, and enlightened us with their corresponding realities. I was shocked by how many of these misperceptions I had assumed were true, and also by how complex and nuanced the realities are compared to the simplistic myths that surround them.

Among the problems he addressed were:

- Cultural norms assume that eating 3 meals a day is ideal, but it's not.
- "Calories in -- calories out" in 24-hour units is not how our bodies work. Energy needs are best met in real time.
- Thinking of lack of hydration as something to recover from (i.e., drinking when thirsty), rather than finding ways to stay hydrated and avoid thirst.
- Eating protein is most effective if it's distributed equally throughout the day's meals, and not primarily in a large dinner.

There was so much more beyond this brief summary. <u>Linked here</u> are the 31 slides that Dr. Bernardo used in his presentation. I found the depth of detail fascinating, particularly some of the graphs showing the results of his research. I hope you will find it as interesting and valuable as I did.

Reflections from the MTNA National Conference

Nine MTNA members from Wisconsin attended the MTNA National Conference this month, five of which were attendees from MAME specifically. MAME's very own Dr. Jess Johnson gave an excellent presentation on vulnerability in teaching with her colleague, Midori Koga.

It was an excellent conference; I attended sessions on a variety of topics including the following:

- Teaching and improving students' improvisation
- Masterclasses with beginner, intermediate, and advanced students, as well as a technique-focused masterclass
- Understanding taxes for an independent studio owners
- Teaching complex polyrhythms (5 against 7, 6 against 11, etc.)
- Improving my studio website
- And so many more!

The range and breadth of topics meant that I could learn just about anything, AND connect with colleagues, network, and enjoy professional camaraderie. Not to mention the recitals and performances available to all attendees for free were given by both visiting guest artists and the highest caliber students. As a first-time attendee of the conference, I can't recommend the whole experience highly enough. Next year (2025), the conference will be in Minneapolis, and the year after (2026) in Chicago, so it'll be two locations much closer to home, hopefully making it even more accessible for those of us in MAME.

Cost may be a barrier to attending the national conference (it was for me!), so keep an eye out for scholarship/grant opportunities advertised by MTNA to help you attend if this is something you're interested in. I would not have been able to go without a grant I received from the National Piano Foundation, (advertised in an MTNA email a few months ago) to help defray financial barriers. Many of these types of grant programs don't receive a huge number of applicants, so it may not be as

competitive as you'd think. It's always worth a shot!

If the national conference is out of reach for you, the <u>WMTA State Conference</u> coming up on October 24-26, 2024, is another great way to receive many of the same enrichment, networking, and professional benefits at a fraction of the cost of a national conference. Conferences are an excellent way to get inspired, rejuvenated, and encouraged in this career where so many of us feel burned out and overworked. If you can, save up and plan now to attend, so you can have this professionally invigorating experience. I hope to see you there!
